Programming Languages

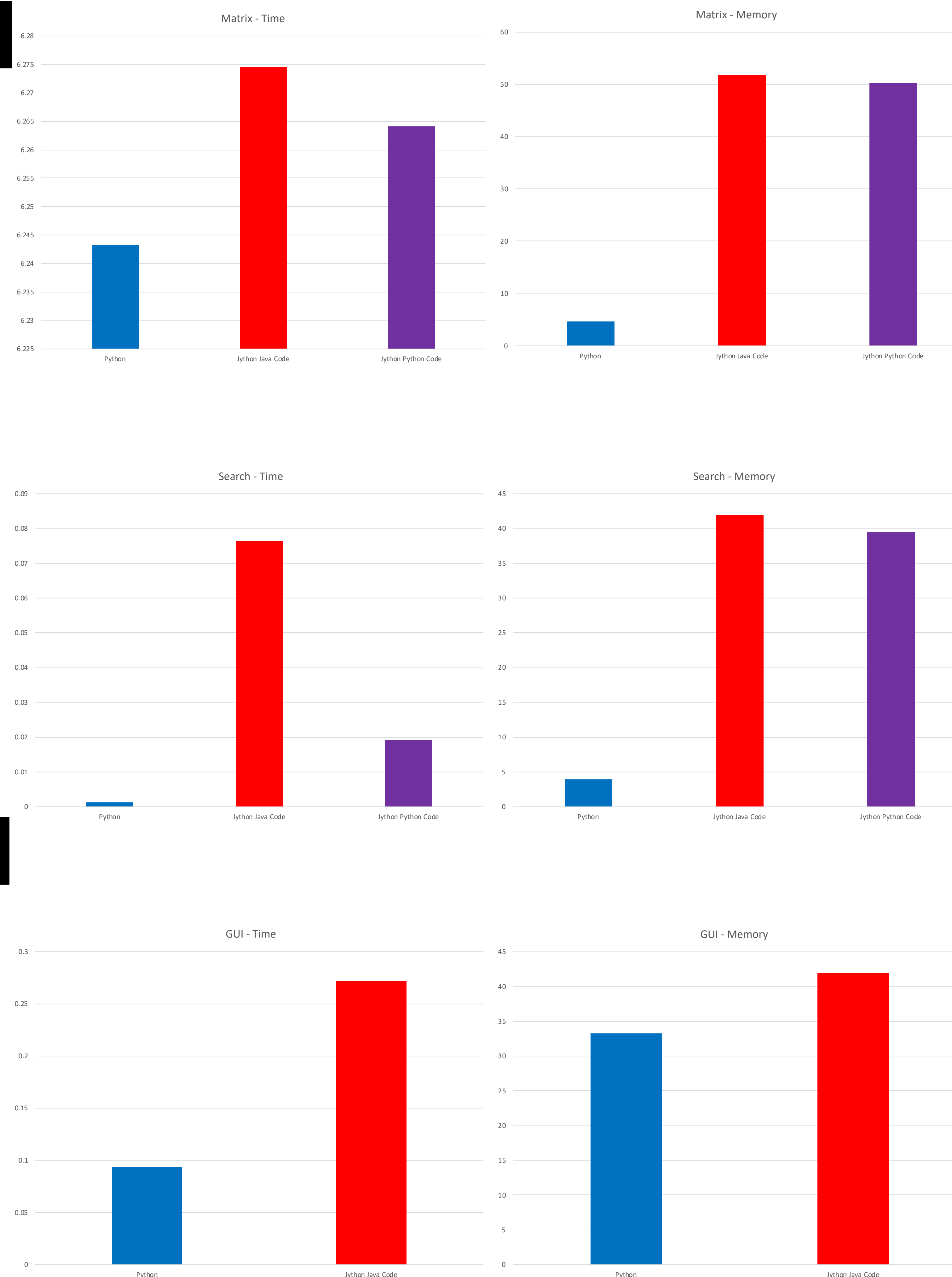

Overview

The premise of this study is to see if Jython can run faster and use less memory than Python. Under these circumstances, 3 different applications were created to test time and amount of memory used.

In this study, each program is ran under three different conditions. The first condition is ran in Python. The second condition is running the same code in Jython but implementing Java classes within it. The last condition is running Jython using the same exact code as the Python code. In each of these programs, the time and amount of memory is measured.
